

Where to find us

We are situated at no. 38 Greaves Street in the Little Horton area of Bradford, the school is in walking distance from The St Luke's Hospital.

(Access to the school can also be gained from Dorset Street.)



Admissions procedure

All those interested in enrolling their child should do so by obtaining an application form, which must be filled in and submitted to the school office. Application forms are available on request from the school office between 9am and 2.30 pm, Monday to Thursday. Or alternatively, by ringing the office number on (01274) 573004 between 9am and 2.30pm, a form will then be sent out by post.

The school operates a policy where by siblings of family members who already have a child in the school will be given first priority. Thereafter all applications will be dealt with on a first come first serve basis.

Please note due to the high demand of parents wishing to enrol their children at an Islamic school, all applications should be made well in advance by parents who already have children studying at the school in order to be guaranteed a place.

All successful applicants will receive confirmation of admission by telephone and letter.

Fee

The current annual fee is £1550 per year with a further one-off non-refundable payment of £100 on admission for the purchase of resources and processing of the application. Fee may be paid in a lump sum at the beginning of the year or in monthly instalments of £155 as a standing order from September to June. Please note parents will be required to pay the full term's fee even if their child leaves mid-way through the term. Fee increases by £50 every year.

The actual cost of educating a child at Crystal Gardens is much higher than the fee charged. The shortfall is made up of voluntary contribution and Qarde Hasanah.

School times

Our school day begins at 8.30am and ends at 2.30pm, Monday to Thursday, and 8.30am to 12pm on a Friday. Please note school doors will not be open before 8.30am.



Staff

All the teaching staff at Crystal Gardens Primary are practicing Muslim Sisters who uphold and promote Islamic teachings. We have a dedicated team of staff, who are educated, experienced, highly motivated and positive role models for the children.

Curriculum

The school provides a broad and balanced academic education according to the National Curriculum in a pure Islamic environment. The school provides a variety of subjects including Numeracy, Literacy, Geography, History, ICT, P.E, Science, Arabic, Urdu, Islamic Studies, P.S.H.C.E, Nasheeds (Islamic songs), Duas, Islamic Stories and Salah lessons.

Early Years - Reception

At this critical initial stage in your child's academic life we believe that a good partnership between parents and staff is essential.

Our aims are to make Reception a place where children feel secure, happy and enjoy themselves, as well as develop emotionally, intellectually, morally and spiritually into confident young individuals.



The curriculum delivered in Reception leads on from any Nursery experience your child has had. The timetable in Reception is structured with set subjects, though learning takes place through child's play as well as teacher led activities.

Policies and Procedures

The school operates a stringent safeguarding policy, anti bullying policy, child protection policy, health and safety policy, admissions policy, and has sanctions in place to deal with pupils who misbehave. All of these are readily available on request.

Islamic Character, Morals and Discipline

The Prophet (saw) said, "From amongst the best gifts a father gives his son, none is better than excellent etiquettes and elegant manners." (Hadith)

Bearing this teaching in mind we expect parents to help in the character building of their children. We will be very particular about how our children

conduct themselves in school. Parents must note the school will endorse or prohibit anything that Islam endorses or prohibits.

Uniform

At Crystal Gardens Primary School the children's school uniform reflects their attitude to learning. The simple yet elegant uniform complies with the Islamic dress code, which the pupils are encouraged to adhere to.

Each child will be expected to wear the full school uniform.



Boys

- Grey Jubba / shalwar kameez
- Grey / White hat
- Plain grey jumper / cardigan
 - no logos or other colours
- Black pumps

Girls

- Grey shalwar kameez or grey pinafore with grey or white long sleeved top
- White scarf
- Plain grey jumper / cardigan -
 - no logos or other colours
- Black pumps

Pupils will be required to wear pumps indoors. Parents should provide their children with sensible shoes, no high heels, and those that are easy to put on and take off.

Due to safety precautions, jewellery such as bangles, necklaces, etc, are not to be worn in school. Girls should wear stud-type earrings if their ears are pierced.

Homework

Children will be given homework and expected to return it on time completed. In order to assist in the children's academic education, parental co-operation is essential.



Academic Performance

School issues annual reports to parents informing them of their results at the end of each academic year.

Our Year 6 has always maintained the national average in SATs tests. Many of our children go on to achieve a scaled score of more than 100 (expected level).

School is subject to Ofsted inspections and is inspected every three years. The last inspection report is available on the Ofsted website or

can be requested from school. Currently on average children at our school are achieving in line or above national expectations.

Lunch

Lunchtime is from 12-1pm. Parents will be required to provide their children with a balanced and healthy packed lunch. Alternatively those parents wanting a warm lunch for their child can order lunches through the external caterer responsible for supplying the school. Information on these can be taken from the office on request.

Holidays

Pupils will be expected to attend punctually throughout the school year. Leave will not be granted for family holidays during term time. All such vacations will have to be arranged within the school holidays. All medical appointments should be made outside of school times.

Details of the school holidays will be passed on to parents at the beginning of the school year.

Salah

Man was created to serve his Lord and thus,

“The Prophet (saw) ordered the believers to teach **Salah** to the children



at the age of seven so they are able to fulfil their purpose in life.” In conjunction with this, Year 3 and above will be expected to observe Salah at school and at home.

Behaviour Discipline and Exclusion

Crystal Gardens has an effective behaviour policy in place. Any bad behaviour, rudeness, disrespect to staff and pupils or damage to school property will be treated very seriously.

Severe breach of the behaviour policy committed by a child may leave them liable for exclusion.

Quran/Qaidah Provision

The school runs an after school madrasah for children who attend the school. Children are taught to read Quran and Qaida in these classes implementing the rules of Tajweed.



Duas and Salah although taught in the school's

overall curriculum are also reiterated through these sessions.

Classes run straight after school until 4pm Monday – Thursday and until 2pm on a Friday. Parents wishing to enrol their child in this class may do so by contacting the school office.

Special Educational Needs (SEN)

The school does not have LEA SENCO provision, however, parents with children who have SEN needs can apply at their own discretion. We will endeavour to do our best to support these children.
